Golden Plate Awards Luncheon Honors Those Who Help Others

Before a sell out crowd, this year's Neighbors Helping Neighbors award recipients and Duarte Mayor Jim Kirchner, the 2001 Heart in Hand Humanitarian, were honored on June 6. The award luncheon was held this year at the Holiday Inn.

The keynote speaker for the luncheon was humanitarian and sportscaster Ed Arnold. Arnold, the co-host of KOCE-TV's "Real Orange" program, has been honored for his own efforts on behalf of many groups, including the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation. While most of his comments were lighthearted, Arnold concluded by focusing on what he called the bare necessities: belief, attitude, respect and education. He deplored the loss of these ideals among many people and praised people who adhered to them.

It is the custom for the mayor of the city where the Heart in Hand Humanitarian lives to present the award. Since Jim Kirchner was both the recipient and the mayor of Duarte, he was additionally honored to have L.A. County Mayor Michael Antonovich present his award. Mike recounted many of Jim's contributions and activities on behalf of the whole community and especially the citizens of Duarte.

The Neighbors Helping Neighbors awards were presented by Joan Whitenack and Betty McWilliams. The recipients were selected by the Center's Board of Directors for their extraordinary contributions to the Center. Presented with beautifully inscribed Golden Plates were: Thelma Mosley - Volunteer/Foothill Unity Center, Connie Motander - Volunteer/ Rainbow's End, Anita Oaks - School, Oneonta Congregational Church - Religious Organization, Los Angeles Regional Food Bank - Corporate Organization, the Seidners - Family Award, Little Stuga Gift Shop - Business/Rainbow's End, J.P. Paper Shredders - Business/Foothill Unity Center. Gideon Libby, J.P. Paper Shredders, summed up the sentiments of many fellow recipients when he said simply, "Thank you for the opportunity to give."

A Special Report from the Executive Director...

When you think of the poor in Los Angeles County, where do you think they live? As you look at this pie chart from the Weingart Institute, it is not surprising to see downtown Metro with 17.6% of the poor and Central close behind at 17.3%, as those are generally considered poverty areas. However, you may be astonished to see that nearly the same number of poor–16.7%—live right here in our San Gabriel Valley. The difference is less than one per cent.

We need to be aware of a problem in order to help bring about a solution. That is the purpose of this article.

There are relatively few services available for

the over 350,000 poor of the San Gabriel Valley. For example, of the nearly one thousand charities that receive food to distribute from Los Angeles Regional Food Bank (which serves only L.A. County), only thirty are located in the S.G.V. Although there is substantial food available to low-income families, there are very few effective distributors. There are many transitional shelters in Central and Metro areas (where we sometimes have to send peo-

ple), but very few to serve the S.G.V. from Monterey Park to Pomona.


How could this happen? Possibly because there is no single entity or group to develop or coordinate solutions to the many real problems in the area. The 31 cities and 14 incorporated areas (nearly 300 square miles, 1.68 million people) of the San Gabriel Valley are represented by five

U.S. Congressmen, five State Senators, six State Assemblymen, and two L.A. County Supervisors.

We are concerned because our phone rings all day long with inquiries about food, shelter and other crisis needs from people outside our service area. Since Foothill Unity Center's success is the result of the combined efforts of the many facets of our community working together, the broader community of the San Gabriel Valley needs to work together to develop ways of helping the less fortunate, thus creating a better living environment for all of us.



This spotlight is on Edie Van Dyke, who quietly arrives at the Foothill Unity Center every

Monday and Friday morning at 7:00 a.m.! She begins by helping to setup the kitchen. This means bagging lunches for the homeless, bagging the freezer and refrigerated items for our families and making sure the "extras" shelve is stocked. Then at 8 a.m., the real fun starts, as she makes sure that each family receives all of the food and goodies that they are supposed to get. She fills basket after basket with lots of food. She makes sure that each family gets regular food, USDA food, fresh produce, frozen items, breads, goodies and more. (For those of you that have not been at the Center during a food distribution, we have between 8 to 9,000 pounds of food going through our doors into neady families homes each work, that is a lot of food!). There are yearly

In the Monrovia Day Parade, Sylvester Carter provided us not one, but two vehicles. Joan and Betty rode down the street in style in a Saab convertible, while our soap box racers and their cars rested up for the big event by riding down the street on the back of a decorated 1950 Ford flatbed truck. Signs also advertised our fundraiser, a Krispy Kreme Donut booth.

The donuts were a great success. We sold 270 dozen donuts (that's 3240 Krispy Kremes). Our thanks to director Charlotte Schamadan for having a great idea and making the arrangements for us. We ran out almost immediately and had to keep going back for more. Nearly 160 youngsters participated in the Soap Box Classic. At the Center, our client children entered into a drawing to determine who would race the Center's cars. We had four children racing in the rascal cars and one in our KFI-AM classic car. Ferrari Brothers also loaned our alternate driver a car so that all our drivers would have a chance to race—thanks, Mark.

Do you remember how exciting the first day of school was when you were a child? Usually you had new clothes, right down to your shoes and underwear. That first day meant fresh new pencils and pens. Depending on your grade or the era in which you attended school, it might have meant a new lunch box, binder, or pencil case. Whatever the items, they were new, and therefore special, and you felt special and ready for school because of that.

It is our aim to give our low-income clients' children that same feeling of being special. We want to help them start the school year out positively. Last year we helped over 400 children, and

we'll provide for 540 this year.

Our Back to School Distribution will be held on Thursday, August 30, at the Armory Building (corner of Olive and Mountain, Monrovia). Community participants will include Methodist Hospital and the County Health Department. In addition to clothing and school supplies, there will be free haircuts, bubble bath, and even a drawing for a renovated computer system. The smiles and the excitement of the children as they prepare to start school is very moving.

"It is largely because of the influence of Leonor that we now refer to it as a 'boutique and bargain shop.' She is a large part of the success of the Rainbow's End."
